

Participants were able to acquire the most up-to-date information from every part of the world and observe how they are being implemented in Taiwan.

The year of 2018 also marks a prominent year for the Center. As it was established in 1968, the Center joyfully celebrated its 50th anniversary. Distinguished guests, partners from different agencies and countries attended the whole-day celebration. All the achievements have to be attributed to my colleagues, our long-time friend-Lincoln Institute, and faculty of the Center. My most sincere gratitude extends to them, thank you!

### Introduction to the ICLPST

Outside of the Center







The International Center for Land Policy Studies and Training (ICLPST) was established in 1968. Till 2018, it has been running for 50 years. It is an autonomous and nonprofit international organization, jointly sponsored by the Council of Agriculture (COA), Executive Yuan, the Republic of China, and the Lincoln Institute of Land Policy (LILP), Cambridge, Massachusetts, U.S.A. Before January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2000, it was named Land Reform Training Institute (LRTI).

The establishment of the Center was based on the Taiwan land reform experience. It is devoted to providing training and research opportunities for government officials, professionals and others who take interests in land and tax policies and rural development. Since the 21<sup>st</sup> Century, the Center expanded its training fields by increasing agriculture related topics and conducting training

courses and cooperative projects on specific themes commissioned by other countries. We hope that, through cultivating agricultural man power, the overall economy shall be raised and living standard improved.

At the Center the training programs blend theory and practice in order to suit the diverse needs of the participants. With intensive lectures, participants acquire the skills and techniques needed to better understand and facilitate land policies, rural development, and tax programs in their respective countries. The oftencompetitive selection of participants for international training courses and various foreign commissioned training projects have borne out the fact that these sessions offered and conducted by the Center are much in demand by the professional circles of agriculture and land management.



## **Organizational Setup**

The organizational structure is threetiered, comprising the Board of Directors, the Executive Committee and the Administrative Office.

The Board of Directors is the Center's guiding unit, which formulates general policies of the Center and approves its annual programs and budget. The Chair and Co-chair are appointed respectively by the COA of the Republic of China and the LILP, USA. The Board members are nominated by both sides.

The Executive Committee oversees curriculum development, supervises

programs, and provides advice on the annual budget and is responsible for the selection of participants and faculty members. Currently it has seven members, with its Chair and Co-chair appointed respectively by the LILP and the COA.

The Administrative Office is headed by the Director, who formulates and presents the annual programs and the budget to the Board through the Executive Committee. Under the Director were two divisions to execute and manage all the projects. They are the Training Division and the Administration Division.

## The 50<sup>th</sup>Anniversary

Ever since its establishment, the Center has dedicated itself in organizing trainings pertaining to land policy and agriculture. As one of the key institutes engages in enhancing international collaboration and building diplomatic bonds with the nation's allies, the Center has set up its reputation internationally and formed a network connecting experts in related fields all over the world. The year of 2018 marks a significant milestone for the Center, in which the Center celebrates its 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary. On the date of May 25<sup>th</sup>, several celebration events took place at the Regent Hotel, Taipei, exhibiting and manifesting the Center's achievement and the importance of the training in land and agriculture. Turnout for the whole-day event reached 250 people from 50 variant countries. Main events are shown as follow:

## A Grand Opening Ceremony

The celebration was unveiled with the opening remarks given by Mr. Tsung-hsien Lin, Minister of Council of Agriculture, Dr.Jiunn-rong Yeh, Minister of the Interior, Mr. Peter M.Y. Tsai, and Secretary-General of Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Ambassador of El Salvador, Peru, and Belize attended the ceremony with other Representatives of the Diplomatic Corps. A keynote speech on "Indonesian Agrarian Reform and Systemic Comprehensive Land Registration" was then made by Dr. Ir. Budi Situmorang, Director General of Spatial Utilization, Ministry of Agrarian Affairs and Spatial Planning, Indonesia. More than 200 people from 40 plus countries participated, including:

Dr. Lincoln, the founding board member and a key figure of ICLPST, had been the cochair of the Board between 1969 and 2001. He handed the position of cochair to his daughter, Kathryn Jo Lincoln, in 2002 and remained a board member himself ever since. His unretained dedication and contribution brought the Center to today's glory. His passing in March, 2018, at the age of 93, has left a void in many people's heart. On this meaningful occasion, the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the International Center for Land Policy Studies and Training, a presidential citation from the government of the Republic of China (Taiwan) was presented to Dr. Lincoln in commemoration of his lifetime accomplishment and devotion.



Researches upon Taiwan's Land Policy changes in the Post-Land Reform Era and its influence in land tax, urban revitalization, and farmland deregulation were first conducted by the participating scholars. This forum was then acted as a platform where the research results and paper were published. The 150 attendees, comprised

by experts in related fields, representatives of diplomatic corps, ICLPST alumni, board members of the Center, participants from the 137<sup>th</sup> and 138<sup>th</sup> regular sessions, and graduate students, participated in the forum and contributed their ideas and thoughts to the discussion. The whole content of the forum took the form of live broadcast. Topics covered in the forum are as follow:

### Performance and Achievements

During 2018, the center had organized 11 training sessions. These sessions can be categorized into three different types: co-sponsored regular sessions, training sponsored by ROC Government, and training commissioned by foreign government. Middle- and high-level officials, experts in different fields, engineers and professionals from public sectors were invited to the 11 sessions. In total, 188 trainees from 58 countries compassing East Asia and Pacific, West Asia, Africa, Europe and Latin America and Caribbean regions received trainings in Taiwan. The trainings conducted by the Center are listed as below:

(1) Four co-sponsored regular sessions: the 137<sup>th</sup> Regular Session on Land Policy for Sustainable Rural Development, the 138<sup>th</sup> Regular Session on Land Taxation and Valuation, the 139<sup>th</sup> Regular Session on Infrastructure Development and Planning, and the 140<sup>th</sup> Regular Session on Agricultural Development and Policy

These regular sessions were designed for four weeks and aimed at inviting middle-level officials from related government agencies to attend the training. Lectures were prominent for the training, 40 experts and professors from Brazil, China, Germany, Taiwan, and the USA shared their professions with the participants. Three one-day seminars were held to provide a platform for the participants to present their country reports. Through the seminars, participants were able to pinpoint every country's current problems whether in land use, property tax, agriculture economics or urban planning. Other than the indoor learning, field visits gave the participants an opportunity to see how the theories introduced in the lectures are implemented in Taiwan's government agencies. These training sessions were co-sponsored by ROC Council of Agriculture (COA), Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MOFA), Ministry of Interior (MOI), the Center and Lincoln Institute.

(2) Two trainings sponsored by ROC government: Seminar on Geographical Information System and Land Management and Seminar on Knowledge-based Economy and City Competitiveness

These seminars were scheduled for two weeks and were fully sponsored by the MOFA. High and middle level officials were the targeted audiences. Lectures, discussion and field trips are equally allocated. The two seminars sought to share Taiwan experience and most up-to-date development with the participants. Besides the presentations given by the local professors, participants could explore further about Taiwan during the field visits at both private and public sectors. To facilitate and inspire more discussions and communication between each country, all participants were required to do a country report.



(3) Five trainings commissioned by foreign government: Courses on Plant Gene Transfer, Animal Disease Diagnosis, Fisheries Diseases, Water Management and Poultry Diseases

During 2018, there were five training courses commissioned by the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia. Specific topics and requirements were appointed directly by the KSA government. Lectures, laboratorial experiments, visits to government agencies and private enterprises aiming to find solutions for these specific subjects were arranged for the two-week courses. The representative corps was able to obtain the first-hand experience from Taiwan's specialists, leading companies and agencies.

The training course in general contained three essential parts in the curriculum for participants to consolidate related knowledge. The first part was lectures and discussions. For the regular sessions, the course coordinator helped to shape the course structure and content. The Center then invited renowned international professors to deliver lectures on theories and issues related to the themes and local professors to share Taiwan experiences. The professors widely used case studies, group works, in-class assignments and role-play activities to facilitate the understanding of lecture content. As for the seminars, they targeted at middle and high-level officials and experts and emphasized more on Taiwan experience in the areas of advanced technology on GIS applications and strategy on city competitiveness. The second part focused on exchanging ideas and professional knowledge among participants and professors. Pivotal to the training, all participants were asked to prepare one country report which should cover an overall country profile, ongoing projects and difficulties they are facing or solutions that have been applied. Participants valued this session greatly for it offered them not only the opportunity to get to know more about their colleagues' countries but also an open floor for them to exchange ideas. Country presentation always serves a crucial part of the training where the participants learn from each other and build a close rapport with each other.

Last but not least, the Center arranged field trips to related public and private sectors for participants to refresh what they had studied in class and to learn from local experiences. Field trips to private and public sectors provide the participants firsthand research results, most advanced models and practical experience. Beside the formal visits and lectures mentioned above, the Center also organized some extra-curricular activities such as introducing Taiwan, speaking Chinese, visiting tourist attractions, sport games and parties. Those activities which had received rave feedbacks from the participants were aiming at providing them a better understanding of Taiwan and helping them build bonds with one another. Taiwan was overall deemed by the participants as their second home.

## **Co-sponsored Regular Sessions**

### The 137th Regular Session on Land Policy for Sustainable Rural Development

This regular session was held from April 27<sup>th</sup> to May 25<sup>th</sup>. Totally, 29 participants from 28 countries attended the training, and 11 lecturers were invited to share their knowledge and experience with the participants. Participants were formed by officials from sectors of Agriculture, Environment, Land Administration, Housing and Rural Planning.

## Lectures and Discussions

Lectures and discussions in RS137 were given and led by 5 overseas and 6 local lecturers. Dr. James Riddell, former chief of FAO Land Tenure Service, served as the course coordinator for RS137. Themes and lectures in this session are shown as follows:

- Week one: The topics were based on sharing Taiwan experiences. Topics including Land Information System, Indigenous Tenure Right, Agricultural Land Use Policy and Land Economics were given by Professors Jimmy Chou, Ai-ching Yen, Stephan van Gasselt, Kuo-ching Lin, and Tzu-chin Lin.
- Week two: Topics under the theme of Rural Economy and Development were led and given by Professor Bastiaan Reydon and Chien-hung Tung, including Land Ownership, History of Capitalism, Agriculture Roles in the Present Economics, and Rural Planning in Taiwan.
- Week three: Topics under the theme of Situating the Local in Land Relations were led by Professor Laura German from University of Georgia. Topics, including Land Administration, Local Sustainable Development in Taiwan, Rights in Rural Resources, were covered by Professors Laura German, Jim Riddell and Shih-jung Hsu.
- Week four: Topics under the theme of Managing Local Governance for Sustainable Development were led by Dr. Rainer Adam, Regional Director of Friedrich Naumann Foundation for Freedom. Topics, including Land Reclamation, Land Consolidation and Rural Land Use Planning, Issues for Land Administrators, and Rural Governance, were given by Professors Jim Riddell and Rainer Adam.

## Field Trips

In order to help the participants to better understand theories and policies learned in the classes, a number of government agencies and research organizations were arranged for formal visits. See the list below:

- 1 Taoyuan City Farmers' Association: Farmers' Association first arranged a visit to the Vegetable Cutting and Washing Plant where the participants were able to observe how the vegetables were sorted, cut, washed, packed and sent. Later, the history, structure and business of Farmers' Association were introduced. Farmers' Association has been around in Taiwan for a long time, and many participants showed interests in this special system during the visit.
- (2) Land Administration Bureau, Taichung City Government: Land Administration Bureau introduced its divisions and responsibilities. After briefings made by the Land Cadaster, Land Valuation and Land Survey Divisions, land registration system and Eland information system were demonstrated.
- YongFeng Community in Taichung: YongFeng Community is a successful example of the Rural Regeneration Scheme. The community and Water and Soil Conservation Bureau elaborated the private and public sectors' roles in implementation as well as the procedure of application and the achievements.
- 4 Center for Space and Remote Sensing Research, National Central University: The Remote Sensing Center has many cooperating projects with Central and South American countries, including satellite monitoring in rainforests and geographic information data in natural resources regions. The Center also has its own observation station.
- (5) Council of Agriculture: COA is the leading agency of Taiwan's agriculture sector. After COA's introduction on the organization structure, Taiwan's agricultural land policies and the status quo of agricultural industry, participants raised questions on Taiwan's international cooperation and the project of returning to the countryside.

### The 138<sup>th</sup> Regular Session on Land Taxation and Valuation

This regular session was held from April 27<sup>th</sup> to May 25<sup>th</sup>. Totally, 27 participants from 27 countries attended the training, and 7 lecturers were invited to share their knowledge and experience with the participants. Participants were formed by the officials from sectors of Finance, Taxation, and Land Registry.



### **Lectures and Discussions**

Lectures and discussions in RS138 were given and led by 3 overseas and 4 local lecturers. Professor Steve Tsui, from Chinese Culture University, served as the course coordinator for RS138. Themes and lectures in this session are shown as follows:

- (1) Week one: The topics were based on sharing Taiwan experiences. Topics including Valuation for Property Tax, Government Finance, Tax Policy and Tax System, Fiscal Decentralization and Local Government Finance were given by Professors Tzu-chin Lin, Steve Tsui, Ming-hung Yao and K. C. Lin.
- 2 Week two: Topics under the theme of Economics, Taxation Policy and Theory, including Public Finance and Tax Policy, Economic Analysis, Defining Tax Bases-Wealth, Consumption and Income, were led by Professor William O'Brien from Worcester State University.

- (3) Week three: Topics under the theme of Local Public Finance, including Urban Public Finance, Economics of Local Government, Tax Reform Experience in Taiwan, Tax Increment Finance (TIF), was led by Dr. John Anderson from University of Nebraska-Lincoln.
- 4 Week four: Topics under the theme of Land Valuation, including Principles and Concepts of Property Valuation, Methods of Mass Appraisal, Evaluation of Valuation Performance, were covered by Stephan Roach, co-owner of Jones, Roach & Caringella, Inc.



### Field Trips

In order to help the participants to better understand theories and policies learned in the classes, a number of government agencies and research organizations were arranged for formal visits. See the list below:

- 1 National Taxation Bureau of Central Area, Ministry of Finance: National Taxation Bureau was set up in 1992. It offers services, including individual income tax, business tax, estate tax, gift tax and tax administration, for five cities in central Taiwan.
- (2) Land Administration Bureau, Taichung City Government: Land Administration Bureau introduced its divisions and responsibilities. After briefings made by the Land Cadaster, Land Valuation and Land Survey Divisions, land registration system and Eland information system were demonstrated.
- 3 Local Tax Bureau of Taichung City: The bureau takes full control of managing and levying local taxes. Currently there are 8 branches serving the citizens of the whole Taichung City. The services they offer include tax related auditing, land value tax, vehicle license tax collecting and so on.
- 4 Finance Department, New Taipei City Government: Finance Department introduced how government leases state-owned land and how the government works with private sectors to increase government revenue.
- (5) Fiscal Information Agency, Ministry of Finance: Fiscal Information Agency gave a report on fiscal information system and local tax information management.

- 1 Agriculture Bureau, Taichung City Government: There are some major policies that the Bureau is now conducting, including Agriculture Forums, Organic Agriculture Promotion, and Pesticide Residue Monitoring. Since its establishment, ATRI has dedicated itself in developing Taiwan's high technology in every agricultural field.
- 3 Taiwan Agricultural Research Institute: The institute showcased the methodology of sorting and preserving genetic variation seeds to the participants in their display room as well as greenhouses which are solar-powered.

- 4 Taipei Agricultural Products Marketing Corporation: The corporation manages the wholesales of agriculture products within the Taipei metropolitan region. 
## Field Trips

## Projects Commissioned by Other Countries

## Training Projects Commissioned by the Ministry of Environment, Water and Agriculture, Kingdom of Saudi Arabia

It has been 12 years since the government of Kingdom of Saudi Arabia first commissioned the Center to conduct training courses related to technology exchange and bilateral cooperation regarding agricultural aspect. All training topics were directly appointed by the government of KSA. This year 5 trainings had been conducted, and the topics were: Plant Gene Transfer, Animal Disease Diagnosis (Risk Assessment and Data Analysis), Fisheries Diseases, Water Management and Poultry Diseases. In total, 29 officials from the KSA Ministry of Environment, Water and Agriculture were accommodated by the Center.

Leading government agencies in different aspects assisted the arrangement of the training courses. All training sessions comprised two parts: classroom lectures and official visits. Classroom lectures were delivered by local researchers, professors and engineers. Lecturers brought their research results, new techniques, most resent revelations to the classrooms in the hope of helping the participants to search for some solutions for their questions. Because of the differences in climate, topography and education between Taiwan and KSA, the participants and the lecturers were able to view the crux of each problem from various perspectives.

## A Plant Gene Transfer

The training course of Plant Gene Transfer was held between June 25<sup>th</sup> to July 6<sup>th</sup>. Seven officials from the Ministry of Environment, Water and Agriculture attended the course. Dr. Wen-li Lee, Associate Researcher and Head of Tropical Fruit Tree Department from Fengshan Tropical Horticultural Experiment Branch of Taiwan Agricultural Research Institute, assisted in coordinating lectures and field visits. Course topics included plant gene transfer techniques for tobacco, papaya and banana.

Visits to government agencies and research institutes were arranged, including TARI-Gene Transfer Plant's Biological Safety Assessment and Quarantine Facilities, Taoyuan District Agricultural Research and Extension Station (TDARES), Academia Sinica-Plant Gene Transfer Research Achievements and the Plant Molecular Breeding Greenhouse.




### Services and Assistance

The Center provides comprehensive services and assistance to participants to make their training and life at the Center easier and more colorful.

In aspect of daily life assistance, the Center provided information and assistance on transportation between airport and the Center, visa check, return air-ticket confirmation, meals, medical assistance, contact with embassies/representative offices in Taiwan, religious needs, and travel information. As a tradition, the Center also arranged a colleague who speaks fluent English to be on duty, providing services and assistance to participants in time of need.

### **Buildings and Facilities**

The building of the ICLPST has a history of 50 years. Many parts and interior attachments have taken some wear and tear as time goes by. The overall building of the dormitory was renovated in 2011. Recently, the Center has been updating and repairing those dilapidated facilities in the dormitory, laundry rooms, kitchen and canteen. As the Center now provides only two meals, breakfast and lunch, during the weekdays to the participants, it has increased the participants' need in self-catering.
